

CHAIR REPORT



We are back to pre-Covid levels of participation and we continue to support our Clubs as we all deliver on the SMJFL mission to provide kids with a safe, supportive, and inclusive environment, while promoting health and wellbeing, and maximising participation in Australian Football.

On behalf of the Board, thank you to the many volunteers throughout our Club network for your efforts throughout season 2023.

The 2023 SMJFL Season by the numbers:

- 10,806 players, including 2,446 playing in our girls' competition, across 451 teams
- 724 Umpires, with ages ranging from 12 years old to over 60 years old
- 309 Club Volunteer Umpires
- 3,315 matches scheduled
- 25 Member Clubs, and an additional 2 teams from Black Rock who have subsequently been admitted as the 26th SMJFL Member Club
- 342 volunteer Club committee members and over 6.000 Club volunteers

In terms of participation, this makes the SMJFL one of the largest junior Australian Football competitions in Australia. We are a significantly large community

Season Highlights

Round I began with the U8's Welcome to Footy Carnival at Centenary Park (St Peters). It was fantastic to see new players to the league enjoying a day of football. The league held it's Lightning Carnivals for U8s, U9s, U10 Mixed & Girls, and U11 Girls Division 2 competitions in Rounds 14 & 15. We had 24 clubs represented in the SMJFL OpenCorp Finals Series, playing 180 finals from 24 August to 10 September. Of the 24 Clubs represented in the Finals Series, 23 of these won a premiership. I want to extend a thank you to all Clubs that hosted during the Welcome to Footy Carnival, Lightning Carnivals, and the Finals Series. Without your support and tireless efforts these events would not be possible.

RSEA Park was home to a number of events again this season including our Season Launch/Club Conference, Interleague Jumper Presentation Night, and five AVMJDS games. Special thanks to the St Kilda Football Club for allowing us to continue to use the magnificent facilities at RSEA Park. We also celebrated our 100+ game female players at our inaugural Women of the SMJFL event at the Half Moon Hotel, and we connected with Club committee members and league partners at the OpenCorp B2B Breakfast at the CitiPower Centre.

In front of a record breaking crowd of over 1,100+ people, we celebrated the achievements of our Umpires and players at Kingston Town Hall. We closed the 2023 season with the Options Consulting Group Thank You Dinner at True South in Black Rock – thank you to special guest speaker Dr Peter Larkins for attending.

The SMJFL had over 500 players invited to join the St Kilda Next Generation Academy, which saw 200 of these players participate in the AFL Victoria Metro Junior Development Series (AVMJDS). The pathway from the SMJFL to the AFL was highlighted by 5 ex-SMJFL players being drafted, including Harry Sheezel who was drafted to North Melbourne with pick #3; and a large co-hort also debuting in the 2023 AFL Season. Congratulations to all those participants and I look forward to hearing more of your names read out in the draft in years to come!

CEO REPORT

TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS

PLAYHQ & EGALITARIAN PARTICIPANT FEES

The SMJFL undertook two significant technology projects in the lead-up to the 2023 season. Firstly, we transitioned our competition and membership database to PlayHQ. Secondly, the league adopted an egalitarian approach to participant fees. Pleasingly both projects have provided far greater transparency of the SMJFL participant membership and volunteer engagement while also supporting our Child Safe compliance, and importantly put all participants on an even financial playing field with contributions to league operations.

The significance of the move to PlayHQ cannot be overstated and the willingness and engagement of our Clubs has been outstanding while the support provided by both AFL and PlayHQ ensured the project was a success. As the only league to transition to PlayHQ in 2023 we have seen the benefits of being a part of the AFL's national platform with player movement leading to much improved transparency and ease of processing for player movement & permit approvals. Pleasingly the remaining 8 Victorian metro leagues are currently migrating to PlayHQ ahead of the 2024 Season.

LEAGUE RESOURCING

The SMJFL recognised that Club feedback included calls for greater resourcing in Football Operations and we have taken the time to ensure that as we move into 2024 our resourcing is appropriate. Form follows function, and just as we have taken the time to ensure that our 2023 in-season activations have been supported with increased staffing including at the "Welcome to Football", "Lightning Carnivals" and "OpenCorp Finals Series" the engagement of additional football operations resources across the calendar year, as we enter 2024, will continue to alleviate some of the inherent pressures currently experienced in clubland and, combined with further improvements in fixturing we are confident that the participant experience will again elevate in season 2024. At the same time we have committed additional resources into the SMJFL's Umpiring Department and Pathways program and have also committed to complementing AFL Victoria's commitment in Coach Development, similar to our investment in 2023. The 2024 season is shaping up to be very exciting indeed.

STRATEGIC PLAN PRIORITIES

As we enter the final year of the SMJFL 2022-2024 Strategic Plan, 2024 will see us establish our priorities for 2025 and beyond. Our existing plan includes four (4) pillars: Football, Community, Facilities, and Governance. Clubs will have the opportunity to have input into developing the league priorities beyond 2024. It is particularly pleasing to report significant progress against our existing plan, including delivery against our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), with a few actions and strategies ongoing.

FINANCE SUMMARY REPORT

FY23 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The audited financial statements for the year ended 31 October 2023 are included as a supplementary report to the Annual Report and detail a final year net surplus of \$13,640. This represents approximately 0.6% of FY23 turnover and a decrease of approximately \$10k on FY22's result.

Total Income FY23

Total turnover was \$2.258m (+12% on FY22), noting that:

- Operating Income (including Umpire related Income, Fines, Video Sales and Equipment Hire) accounted for 28% of total revenue
- Sponsorship & Grant Income accounted for 25% of total income
- Merchandise Income accounted for 24% of revenue
- Affiliation Fees equated to 21% of total income
- Other Income equated to approximately 1.6%

Total Expenses FY23

Total Operating Expenses totalled \$2.244m, (+12.6% on FY22) noting that:

- Operating Expenses accounted for 37% of total expenses and included Umpire related payments, Insurance Costs, Contractors, Equipment purchases and hire, Video Expenses, Trophies and Medical Expenses
- Employment Expenses accounted for 28% of total expenses
- Merchandise Expenses accounted for 23% of expenses
- Administration Expenses accounted for 6% of total expenses
- **Professional Fees** (including accounting, legal, and audit fees as well as consultancy and recruitment expenses) accounted for 4.5% of total expenses

The SMJFL Balance Sheet is contained within the audited financial statements

- At 31 October all Receivables were current
- Total inventory is slightly lower than FY22 at \$28k and consists of Merchandise (Umpire Uniforms and training balls) that will be on-sold in FY24
- Payables includes year-end accruals, PAYG and Superannuation
- Income received in advance related to sponsorships received in advance
- Total equity combined with the year-end surplus has increased by \$13,640 to approximately \$795k (see notes below)

Recognising that a key focus of the league continues to be the removal of barriers to participation, finances are identified as being a key contributor in determining participation rates. Ensuring our Member Clubs are financially viable and sustainable is critical and through the OpenCorp Community Fund the league was pleased to be able to provide financial relief totaling over \$66,000 to support of our Member Clubs during FY23. We thank OpenCorp for their generous support of our families.

Approximately 25% of the SMJFL's annual turnover is directly related to sponsorship and grant income which assists us in keeping league related expenses as low as possible. Explanation of the need for Cash Reserves

As a Not-for-Profit (NFP) organisation the SMJFL is permitted to report a surplus providing this is put towards pursuing the organisation's purpose, which may include contributing to its Cash Reserves.

It is imperative that the SMJFL maintain Cash Reserves to ensure the long-term sustainability of the league as well as meeting any short-term financial obligations and providing cover for any force majeure events (i.e. COVID-19 or claims under the National Redress Scheme).

In addition, a level of Cash Reserves currently deployed in term deposits contributes significantly through interest revenue generation which in FY23 generated approximately \$33k in additional income, effectively acting as a pseudo-sponsor and offsetting additional increases to participant league affiliation fees.

Explanation on how the appropriate level of Cash Reserves is determined

The SMJFL Cash Reserves Policy (Updated 2023) dictates that several factors will be considered when determining the minimum level of Cash Reserves. They are that the Cash Reserves:

i. must be sufficient to cover the liabilities listed on the Balance Sheet

ii. must be sufficient to cover 6 months employment costs as budgeted in the P&L

iii. future projects of the SMJFL, both known and unknown

Currently, the leagues level of Cash Reserves include:

- a. Financial Obligations (liabilities and 6 months' employment expenses) of circa \$687k
- b. Reserves for specific announced capital projects \$0k
- c. Reserves for unspecified projects \$100k
- d.TOTAL \$787k

Current level of Cash Reserves

The SMJFL's current Cash Reserves sit at circa \$600k, being cash balance less liabilities less working capital of \$250k. Cash at bank is currently circa \$957k.

Planned / Proposed use of the Cash Reserves over the next financial year

The Board has approved the use of some of the Cash Reserves for the next financial year, including:

- Additional human resources in Football Operations Administration, Umpiring and Coach Development and Club Development & Support
- Investment in technology resources to support Football Operations
- Redevelopment of the SMJFL Website for greater user experience
- Additional support for clubs including investment in website support
- Capital Works Project potential electronic scoreboard at Moorleigh Reserve

Planning for season 2024 is well underway and the team look forward to continuing to deliver great football experiences for our SMJFL community. In the meantime, I wish each of you a safe and enjoyable summer break.

FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

Season 2023 was the biggest season the SMJFL has ever had, with more teams, more events, more finals, and more participants. Operationally the season could never exist without the thousands of volunteers across all our Clubs. The contribution these people made to helping the season be a huge success is appreciated and we enjoyed working with you all.

The Football Operations team this year welcomed Nathan Broadbent as Football Administration Coordinator and Sarah Dowlan as our Football Administration Intern. With a restructure to our Umpiring department, Doug Haworth was appointed Head of Umpiring.

The implementation of PlayHQ for the 2023 season was a significant administrative undertaking for both our staff and our club volunteers – we would like to acknowledge the PlayHQ team for their support throughout this transition and for running the online training sessions for our Club volunteers. Overall, the introduction of PlayHQ has streamlined Match Day operations and will continually enhance the experience for everyone involved in the administration.

In addition, several new initiatives and processes were adopted or restructured to enhance the SMJFL's Football Operations in season 2023. These include the Club meetings held in February, and changes to the Grading process. Specifically, the Grading Committee was restructured to be more collaborative, with representatives from all 25 Member Clubs. A greater use of data to drive the Grading of teams was incorporated in this year's process, with the SMJFL continuing to look at ways to make better use of data to support improved decision-making and greater transparency between Clubs and the SMJFL. The Prep-to-Play program, the Injury and Concussion Working Party and the Female Football Working Party were also formed in season 2023.

In 2023, we had three SMJFL representatives recognised for their contribution to the game at the AFL Victoria Community Awards Night. Congratulations to:

- Mark Robinson AFL Male School Teacher of the Year (Waverley Park Hawks)
- Sarah Donlon AFL Victoria Female Development Umpire Coach
- Dan Mackay David Parkin Junior Coach of the Year (East Brighton Vampires JFC)

Lightning Carnival: U11 Girls Division 2 South Melbourne Districts Junior Football Club In 2023 the league fixtured over 3,315 games, for 451 teams and 10,806 participants, across 69 divisions.

The 10,806 participants in season 2023 included 36 'aged out' participants who competed in the U17.5 Boys age group, via Over Age exemptions. Without this opportunity, 29 of these players would've discontinued playing football altogether, and the remaining 7 were unsure whether they would've kept playing. The SMJFL has already opened Over Age Exemption applications for Season 2024, with the hope that the adoption of this policy will be an important part of the league's retention strategy.

The greater presence of night matches in the 2023 season was well received by Clubs, providing greater flexibility with fixturing and reducing the number of forfeits. That included a significant number of mid-week matches during the winter school holidays. The league is keen to build upon that number in season 2024 should it continue to be popular.



In 2023, Paul Jemmeson joined our Football Operations team as our Coach Developer working alongside the AFL with the delivery of Coaches courses and Club Coaching Charters. In 2023, we had 981 which included 62 females. Coaching Charters were completed for Beaumaris JFC, Dingley JFC, Bentleigh JFC, Murrumbeena JFC, Oakleigh Dragons, St Bedes / Mentone Tigers AFC and St Peters FC.

AFLVICTORIA METRO JUNIOR DEVELOPMENT SERIES

The AFL Victoria Metro Junior Development Series (AFLJDVS) was played over the June long weekend. The AFLJDVS continues to provide players and coaches in the Interleague program great opportunities to develop, with the St Kilda FC and their Next Generation Academy playing a key role in the program's success.

Highlights:

- Night matches played on Wednesday 30th May
- Two night matches played at RSEA Park
- U14 Girls age group added
- SMJFL fielded 2 x U14 Girls teams

ROUND I

We began the 2023 season in Round I with the U8 Welcome to Footy Carnival. The Carnival was played as a round robin format at the one central venue, providing a memorable introduction to junior football for the children and their families. The SMJFL would like to acknowledge St Peters FC for the magnificent job they did hosting this year.



U7S PROGRAM

In collaboration with AFL Victoria, we successfully launched our first-ever Under 7s program for Auskick participants. The program was a 4-week match play experience and gave aspiring players and parents considering joining the league in season 2024 their first taste of junior football. A special thank you goes to Cheltenham JFC and St Paul's McKinnon JFC for hosting the Under 7s program.

LIGHTNING CARNIVALS

Lightning Carnivals for U8s, U9s, U10s Mixed, U10 Girls, & U11 Girls Division 2 competitions were held in Rounds 14 & 15. 432 games were played and it was fantastic to see the improvement in skill from the beginning of the season. Special thanks goes to St Paul's McKinnon JFC, Port Melbourne Colts JFC, Highett JFC, and Cheltenham JFC for hosting the carnival.





SMJFL OPENCORP FINALS SERIES

The 2023 season closed with the SMJFL OpenCorp Finals Series, which was our biggest finals series to date (180 matches). This included some exciting new innovations, such as mid-week finals and an alternative finals structure for the U14 Mixed Div I and 2 competitions.

It was great to see all our Clubs well represented in the Finals and Grand Finals, with 23 of 25 Clubs winning either a Grand Final or Lightning Carnival. I'd especially like to acknowledge the following Club achievements:

- Beaumaris FC for being the first Club to win U17.5 Boys Division I & U18 Girls Division I
- East Malvern JFC for winning the most premierships of any Club (6)

A big thank you to all our additional staff who helped with match management and the Club volunteers who worked with us to deliver the finals series.



FOOTBALL OPERATIONS DISCIPLINE


Another achievement coveted by Clubs is the Club Behaviour Award, which compiles the Umpire's behaviour ratings for each match throughout the season. Congratulations to Ashwood JFC on receiving this award.

In 2023, the SMJFL was pleased with the behaviour by Clubs across the league. It was great to see minimal Red Cards being handed out in the first 5 rounds of the season (i.e., no more than 2 per round in 4 of the first 5 rounds). Whilst the number of Red Cards per round unfortunately increased between Rounds 5-14, the percentage of Red Cards across the season was still quite low, with less than 2% of matches (4 per round, on average) having a Red Card issued. Discipline in Round 15 and the 3 weeks of finals was outstanding and contributed to a great finish to season 2023. Overall, 8 Clubs had no Red Cards issued, with 18 Clubs having 3 or less Red Cards issued (i.e., I every 5 rounds, which is a great result). The percentage of Poor Ratings and Yellow Cards issued in relation to the total number of matches played (4% and 4%, respectively), were also relatively low.


The league put additional resources into the younger age groups to mitigate on-field behaviour.

On a positive note, we are delighted with the behaviour of the girls age groups, with only 5 Red Cards issued across the entire season.



SMJFL UMPIRING

It was a big year in the OpenCorp SMJFL Umpire Academy to complement another successful season of SMJFL Football. We saw the most matches played in an SMJFL season, which resulted in further growth within the Academy from 2022, rising to the challenge of appointing more Umpires than ever before.

Total registrations peaked at 724, matching the Academy's highest ever number, with 508 of them officiating in at least one match. Breaking those numbers down further, there were 116 Female Umpire registrations (a 76% increase), which attributed to a successful launch of the brand-new Female Development Academy. All of this was supported by a team of 12 staff, including well respected Umpiring figure Peter Marshall as our new Umpire Pathway Mentor, and Novice Field Umpire Coach Sarah Donlon, who was awarded the AFL Victoria Female Development Umpire Coach of the Year.

With the great work of SMJFL Female Umpire Liaison Officer Alanah French, the SMJFL Female Development Academy for Umpires was launched with the aim to build and provide a network for Female Umpires in the SMJFL and contribute to Female representation in the Umpiring space. All participants received a Female Development Academy top and the opportunity to hear from AFLW Field Umpire Samantha Ritchie and VFL Boundary Umpire Olivia Grcic.

The AFL continued its involvement with Community Umpiring, providing the opportunity for SMJFL Umpires Shaun and Subira to Umpire with AFL Field Umpires Brett Rosebury and Nic McGinness. Nic, along with five other AFL Umpires, attended SMJFL Umpire training during AFL Community Umpire Week. These opportunities were also provided with the support of our two AFL Umpire Ambassadors, Leigh Fisher (Field) and Josh Furman (Boundary).

UI5 Boys Division 3 Grand Final: Prahran JFC v East Malvern JFC The SMJFL continued its relationship with the Southern Football Netball League (SFNL) and the Victorian Amateur Football Association (VAFA) Umpire groups to provide Umpires with a pathway to Senior Football and beyond, with 37 SMJFL Umpires appointed to a VAFA/SFNL Grand Final. We also saw nine SMJFL alumni receive a promotion to the State League Development Squads in their respective disciplines.

Our Club Volunteer Umpires again showed great commitment; with 309 registered Umpires generously volunteering their time to support the growth and development of Junior Football. The Umpiring Department and the League would like to extend its appreciation for the efforts of our Club Volunteer Umpires in 2023.

The support from SMJFL Umpire Academy Major Partner OpenCorp has yet again been significant in helping us achieve a successful season, enabling us to provide the best resources available to our Umpires in their development as an officiator of Australian Rules Football. We are thrilled to be continuing our journey with OpenCorp in 2024!

SMJFL PATHWAYS

The Pathways team at the SMJFL work with AFL Victoria, St Kilda Football Club and Coates League Club Sandringham Dragons to provide a pathway for players from Auskick, right through to both amateur and professional levels of senior football.


Part of the Pathways team's responsibilities is the management of a High Potential Player Pathway. This aims to recognise and develop high potential players from all Clubs throughout the league, giving them opportunities to represent their communities and the league in exhibition matches and tournaments across the year.

We kicked off the year with a Pathways Information Session for Clubs at the Club Conference in March. The session provided information and transparency of our policies regarding scouting, selection and progression through the pathway. This year, we broke participation records – extending Academy invitations to over 500 SMJFL players; selecting 200 of these players to represent the league in the AFL Victoria Metro Junior Development Series (AVMJDS).

Driving this increase in participation was the introduction of Victoria's first ever U14 Girls competition within the AVMJDS. After expanding opportunities for girls in 2022, the SMJFL spearheaded this project with AFL Victoria to ensure true parity across genders in 2023. This included establishing an Interleague squad in the U14 Girls age group, and entering two teams into the brand new competition. This now ensures the opportunities for boys and girls in pathway programs are truly equal across the league. We celebrated this addition to the program by developing Girls specific uniforms for the AVMJDS.

Cheltenham JFC (Le Page Park), Oakleigh JFC (Scammel Reserve) and Hampton Rovers AFC (Boss James Reserve) were provided with the opportunity to host matches this year during the AFMJDVS. These three Clubs and their volunteers showcased the league in an amazing light by the way they ran match days and presented their venues for both the SMJFL teams and the other metro leagues.

Interleague uniform changes were another exciting part of the 2023 Pathway Programs! Proud Tiwi and Rembarranga Girl and past AVMJDS player PJ Martin designed the league's first Indigenous playing jumper. PJ's design includes a water monitor & a butterfly. The water monitor is her dreaming in Arnhem Land, which also includes traditional Tiwi Lines; and the butterfly is her totem.

MEMBER & BUSINESS SERVICES

The Member & Business Services department of the SMJFL aims to maintain Member affiliation fees, provide quality and valuable events, initiatives and programs while working in conjunction with the league's Corporate Partners and broader stakeholder network. In 2023, through the support of the SMJFL Partners, we were able to achieve these objectives whilst also building strong connections with relevant stakeholders – aligning with the SMJFL Strategic Plan.

Partnering with businesses whose values align with our own is critically important to the SMJFL, demonstrated through the launch of our new partnerships in 2023 with Grill'd, MOSH, and Gary Bradshaw Photography, and renewing existing relationships with St Kilda Football Club. At the time of writing, the Corporate Partnership Program (CPP) comprises of 23 organisations committed to supporting the 10,808 kids in the South Metro area playing the game of Australian Rules, led by Major Partner, Monash University.

Many of the programs important to the SMJFL would not happen without the support of our partners. One of these programs is the Umpire Academy, supported by OpenCorp, reaching record breaking numbers in 2023 both in female numbers and the entire cohort.

To remain competitive against other sporting codes, the SMJFL, with the support of organisational partners, strive to maintain low costs to play in our league. Further to the financial aid, the SMJFL ensures that resources, both in personnel and technology, are made available to our Member Clubs to ensure the best experience possible for the players, volunteers, committees and supporters.

The SMJFL provides opportunities for our stakeholders to connect through events and activations that our partners have helped to grow in numbers and engagement. The SMJFL launched the Women of the SMJFL in July this year which provided the opportunity for our community to recognise and celebrate the amazing work the females of the SMJFL do for our great game.

It was wonderful to see in 2023 the SMJFL partners connect and collaborate with our Clubs, highlighted by Member Clubs hosting partner rounds throughout the Home and Away season. St Peters FC, Murrumbeena JFC, Hampton Rovers AFC, Mordialloc-Braeside JFC and Ormond JFC hosted our partner network for their themed rounds for which we are very grateful.

In 2023, the SMJFL held our first ever Wellness Round. This initiative was implemented to support the SMJFL's mission statement to promote health and wellbeing in our community. We are privileged to have great organisational partners whose core business revolves around different aspects of wellness. This year My Physio, Tackle Your Feelings, Cabrini Health and VRGF supported Wellness Round with onsite activations and digital offers and promotions to our Members to directly support them on and off the field.



MEMBER & BUSINESS SERVICES PARTNERS



In March 2023, Monash University extended its partnership with the SMJFL for a further two years as Major Sponsor, taking the partnership through to the end of 2024; this will mark the seventh year in partnership once the current agreement ends.

Monash University has supported the league throughout the season in various ways and hosted Round 7 of the season on Sunday 4 June. Murrumbeena JFC hosted the initiative in 2023 and it was fantastic to see many players donning the Monash logo on and off the field. The league and wider SMJFL community were also provided education opportunities through Monash, (including tertiary and other programs) to support the development of the community away from football.

This year, there were five recipients of the Monash University Leader of the Month award. Aris Moustakas (South Melbourne Districts), Hannah Johnston (Port Melbourne Colts JFC), Rory Hannaford (Beaumaris FC), Hadi Gani (Highett JFC) and Sasha Carr (Port Melbourne Colts JFC) displayed the key characteristics of a great leader and were awarded for their efforts. The overall winner of the Monash University Leader of the Year was Aris Moustakas. Aris has taken on an Assistant Coach role with an U8s team this year. Aris also regularly assists the senior teams, across a variety of roles from being a runner to a goal umpire – congratulations Aris.

Monash University also supported the league's Internship program by providing a list of potential candidates for this year's Media Intern position. In March, the league appointed Soraya Rezal, a final-year international student completing her Bachelor of Media Communications (Journalism specialisation). Soraya assisted the Marketing & Communications Coordinator with various communications tasks, mainly in relation to the league's social media pages and events.



OpenCorp and the SMJFL shared a third year in partnership this season, supporting the Umpire Academy, Community Fund and Final's Series. In 2023, the league hosted the most Grand Finals to date, and OpenCorp's support meant the series was well run, resourced and branded; the series took place from 24 August to 10 September.

OpenCorp also provided immense support to the league's Umpire Academy. Their support of the AFL Community Umpiring Round this year, including aiding in the supply of coach education and equipment resources was invaluable for the SMIFL Umpire Academy.

As a Major Partner of the SMJFL Community Fund, OpenCorp hosted Property Insight Sessions at two Member Clubs this year- Hampton Rovers AFC and Waverley Park Hawks. Both clubs provided terrific feedback on these sessions, and the league looks forward to assisting clubs with organising these nights through OpenCorp next season.

OpenCorp also provided various other opportunities across the calendar including providing SMJFL Members complimentary health checks and a Corporate Box experience at Marvel Stadium for stakeholders of the SMJFL.

In 2023, the SMJFL was thrilled to announce a new multi-year partnership with Grill'd. Through this partnership, SMJFL Members were given Awesome Effort Awards on match day which gave them access to a free burger or salad at any Grill'd restaurant.

The Grill'd logo was featured on the back of all new SMJFL player jumpers, with 4,215 SMJFL players in 2023 running around with the Grill'd branding on show. Grill'd supported Round 8 at Boss James Reserve this year, home of the Hampton Rovers AFC. Grill'd were kind enough to hand out "Buy one Get one Free" vouchers to spectators and players on the day.

My Sport Live cover Corporate Events and activations, and the league looks forward to utilising these services for the betterment of the community in 2024 and beyond.

SEASON LAUNCH

Valued partners Options Consulting Group (OCG) and OpenCorp once again supported this year's SMJFL Season Launch, held at RSEA Park in February.

The SMJFL was honoured to have keynote speaker Georgie Stayches join us to talk about volunteerism. The well-represented audience of Club representatives, partners, and LGAs provided fantastic feedback about the address Georgie gave to assist Clubs with strategies to manage their own challenges in the space of volunteer recruitment, engagement, and retention.

The launch also offered the opportunity for event partners OCG and OpenCorp to address the audience as well as new partner Grill'd to introduce themselves and how they will be involved in the SMJFL community through the newly established partnership.

Each panel member provided a fantastic insight into their journey as individuals in their respective fields and where they see the game going to in the future. The audience was captivated by the discussion and enjoyed a great night of acknowledgement and appreciation.

INTERLEAGUE JUMPER PRESENTATION NIGHT

In 2023 the SMJFL once again hosted the Jumper Presentation Night at RSEA Park. It was a special year for this event, as the SMJFL launched the first ever Indigenous guernsey to be worn in the Series.

The guernsey designer and current SMJFL player, PJ Martin, spoke about the design elements and the significance of what these mean to her and her culture.

The event was supported by the St Kilda Football Club and Gary Bradshaw Photography who took individual and team photos on the night as well as of each of the players and teams in their new Indigenous guernseys.

B2B BREAKFAST

This year's Business to Business breakfast Sponsored by OpenCorp was located at the CitiPower Centre, on Lakeside Drive in St Kilda, home of Cricket Victoria.

We were privileged to be joined by Cherie Dear from Dare to Hope as our special guest for the morning, who has been a part of the SMJFL community for many years. Cherie is now a leading figure of the Dare to Hope campaign for the Pancare Foundation. It was amazing hearing about Cherie's journey and turning a tragic circumstance into an opportunity to drive awareness and funding for Pancreatic Cancer.

PRESENTATION NIGHT

Record numbers attended 2023 the SMIFL Presentation Night, with over 1,100 people making their way the Kingston Town Hall to recognise significant achievements from this season.

The league recognised 164 Best and Fairest placegetters, 24 Interleague Award winners and 218 10-year players. This is a massive achievement for all of those players, congratulations to all. We also recognised our Club Volunteer Award winners and the Monash University Leader of the Year.

UMPIRE PRESENTATION DAY

FAIR PLAY CODE

The SMJFL ran the "Fair Play Code" campaign in 2023, which was an extension of the previous "Play Fair" campaign. We adopted Sport Victoria's Play Fair Code to create positive actions and behaviours for each and every one of the community, ensuring a safe, fair, and inclusive sporting environment. With the support of the St Kilda Football Club and Sport & Recreation Victoria, the SMJFL urged the community to "Call Time" on bad behaviour in sport. The campiagn reached over 6,500 accounts on Instagram. This is a Strategic Plan action item for the league and will continue into 2024.

MY SPORT LIVE

In 2023, the SMJFL strengthened its partnership with My Sport Live to stream three feature matches each Home and Away round, and all 52 grand finals. My Sport Live were also our streaming partner for the AFL Victoria Metro Junior Development Series, where they live streamed all SMJFL home games for the Series.

In 2023, the SMJFL continued recognising our young leaders within our Clubs with the Monash Leader of the Month award. This year we opted to produce a small video feature on each monthly winner so that our audience could learn more about who our leaders are and their contributions to the community. CLUBS & COMMUNITY

The Clubs and Community stream of the SMJFL ensures that Member Clubs are supported so their Club is sustainable and able to be run at their full capacity. Club Development, Strategic Planning, Education, Child Safety, Governance, Sustainability, Facilities, Grants, and Participation are among the key areas the Clubs and Community department focus on to support all Clubs.

Going into 2023, the SMJFL and all Member Clubs embarked on a big undertaking to change competition management platforms from GameDay to PlayHQ. With significant in-person and online support from the AFL and PlayHQ teams, the change was extremely successful, providing the league and Clubs with a more up-to-date and fit-for-purpose technology solution that helped to streamline processes and support the new participant fee structure leaguewide.

The face-to-face support was critical to the success of the transition, with the AFL providing PlayHQ support employee, Sarah Pretty, to work with the SMJFL at RSEA Park one day per week to support the team across all departments. This extended into a strongly attended Club Conference session whereby multiple persons from each Club got to ask topical and important queries regarding the platform to the AFL and PlayHQ and be provided with further resources and documents to takeaway and implement at their Clubs.

The SMJFL worked hard throughout the last 18 months to develop and finalise a Diversity and Inclusion Action Plan. The Plan focusses on a number of key areas, including but not limited to the LGBTIQ+, PWD (People with a Disability) and CALD (Culturally and Linguistically Diverse) communities. The plan outlines how the SMJFL can and will showcase and embody acceptance and respect and further ensures everyone from all backgrounds, ages and abilities feel like they belong, are valued, welcomed, and respected as their true self.

In 2023, the SMJFL reviewed, updated, and finalised a number of key policies and guidelines to ensure the safety of Members of the SMJFL, and to equip Clubs and their Child Safety Officer's with the tools and resources to implement said policies. These documents included updates in February to the Child Safety Officer Handbook and SMJFL Child Safe Incident Reporting Procedure, and in May updates were finalised to the SMJFL Safeguarding Children & Young People Policy and SMJFL Compliance Policy and Procedure.

In 2023, the SMJFL and AFL Victoria worked very closely on a number of initiatives all revolving around building a growth and retention strategy in all areas of the region. With a focus on building a strong base of participants in the Under 8 age group, the SMJFL partnered with AFL Victoria to implement the Under 7s four-week program. The program was a huge success and the league looks forward to hopefully seeing many of the players and families who participated joining a Member Club in 2024.



2023 INDIGENOUS GUERNSEY

As part of the SMJFL Reconciliation Action Plan the league sought to engage with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families within the league to design an Indigenous themed guernsey to be worn by the SMJFL at the 2023 AFL Victoria Junior Metro Development Series.

The initiative was led in conjunction with Aunty Katrina Amon, St. Kilda Football Club's Indigenous Player Development Manager. Interested Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families were encouraged to apply and to tell their story through their artwork. The SMJFL received an overwhelming response and chose the design of current East Brighton Vampire player, PJ Martin, a proud Tiwi and Rembarranga Girl.

PJ's design on the guernsey includes a water monitor and butterfly. The water monitor represents her dreaming in Arnhem Land, and the butterfly is her totem.

Jade Kennedy, an emerging artist of Tatti-Tatti heritage from the Wadjak clan helped bring PJ's design to life by transforming her vision into the guernsey, featuring traditional painting which carries a heavy meaning.
